Mom prepared us for life. There will be ups and downs, disappointments and heartaches, but keep going. I've heard her say many times, "Don't feel entitled for anything that you did not sweat and work for, without some adversity, you will never know what you are capable of being. Adversity will either grind you down or polish you up."

Mom always supported everything we did. She had a way of telling you what you may have done wrong but in a way that didn't discourage you. She'd say take responsibility and be responsible for yourself. How can you disagree with that? She gave this same advice to everyone in the family and I know her grandchildren have learned many lessons from her and her words will ring in their heads forever.

I learned a lot by watching mom when she was with other people. She had all the time in the world for them. Mom enjoyed people so much. She had great empathy for all people but especially for people she knew were struggling with life's hardships.

- If a child has love, he or she will need little else and if love is not experienced it doesn't matter what else is given
- It is only a mistake if you repeat it, otherwise it's a lesson
- The only way evil can triumph in this world is if good people do nothing
- The test of your inner security is to see what you can do without in order to be happy
- Until power is replaced by the power of love nothing is going to change in this world. The ones who create power in people, not over people, will change the world.
- Choose your friends carefully. You were born as God's original; try not to be someone else's copy.
- Don't put your wishbone where your backbone should be
- Things work out for the best for those who make the best of how things worked out."
